The Glovebox / Ladies Page

Here is an idea for a quick dessert just for two.

Molten Chocolate Cake in a Mug

INGREDIENTS

1/4 cup all purpose flour

1/4 cup granulated sugar

2 tablespoons cocoa powder

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

Pinch of salt

- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted
- 3 tablespoons milk
- 1 small egg

1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract (or 1/2 teaspoon if using imitation vanilla flavoring)

Half of a 1.55 oz Hershey bar

1 tablespoon (15ml) water


Berries and Ice Cream (optional for serving)

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. In a 2-cup capacity microwave-safe mug or bowl* (see note), whisk together with a fork: flour, sugar, salt, cocoa powder, and baking powder until well combined.
- 2. Add in the melted butter, milk, egg and vanilla. Whisk well to combine, making sure to mix in the flour mixture in the bottom.
- 3. Place the chocolate pieces in the center of the mug. Do not push down; it will sink as it bakes.
- 4. Drizzle the tablespoon of water right on top of the batter.
- 5. Cook in microwave on full power for 1 minute and 15 seconds to 1 minute and 30 seconds, or until the cake rises to the top, the edges look set but the surface of the center looks slightly wet and shiny, and sticks to the finger when touched. It will set up as it sits. Timing will vary according to your microwave, so you'll have to experiment until you find your perfect cooking duration. Do NOT overbake to ensure that saucy, molten-y interior. If the center still looks raw then give it another 5 to 10 seconds. The cake will fall after it comes out of the microwave.

Let it cool for about 5 minutes so you don't burn your tongue, and the waiting will also help thicken the sauce in the bottom. Top with berries or ice cream if desired, then share with a loved one

*A short mug with a wide mouth works best for this recipe. If not available, a small bowl could be used instead. To know if your mug/or bowl is the right size, pour 2 cups of water in it and this should fill it to the top

Electrical System

Generator

The generator on all Ford V-8 passenger and commercial cars and trucks prior to 1938 was a three brush type, the charging rate manually adjusted by movement of the third brush. On 1938 and subsequent model Ford V-8 passenger and commercial cars, and Lincoln-Zephyr passenger cars, a two brush type generator is used on which there is no adjustment. The charging rate is automatically controlled by mean of a voltage regulator.

The generator is air cooled by a fan built into the generator pulley and is rigidly mounted on a bracket which provides easy adjustment of the generator belt.

On all 1940 models the generator capacity has been increased considerably to provide additional current. Various pulley sizes are available for installation on units where operation demands a lower cut in speed and lower maximum output speed. Special generator equipment is also available for individual requirements such as police work, continued low speed operation, etc.

Voltage Regulator

On all two brush type generators the generator output is controlled automatically by means of the voltage regulator. The Voltage regulator is mounted on the front side of the dash. Failure of the voltage regulator to properly control the output of the current will necessitate replacement of this part. Adjustment or servicing of this unit should not be attempted except by an individual or shop having the necessary electrical equipment.

Battery Indicator

The battery indicator (illustrated in Figure 71) indicates the voltage of the battery and generator circuit. It is a protection against damage in the event of failure of the generator or voltage regulator.

The pointer should not at any time read above the green sector.

After turning on the ignition switch and before starting the engine, the pointer should rise to at least to the orange sector, if the battery is fully charged. In the event the indicator fails to reach this point after waiting approximately on minute, the condition of the battery should be checked.

Under normal driving conditions and with no load except the ignition current, the pointer should rise to and remain within the green sector.

If the indicator reaches the right hand red sector, this is an indication that the voltage in the circuit is too high, which may damage the light bulbs, wires, or even the generator itself. If such a condition occurs, the generator voltage as well as the operation of the voltage regulator should immediately be checked to preclude the possibility of damage.


